






# **UEC Users Meeting Subcommittee**

  - Longer ago, had public lecture; more recently, open to lab community but not public
  - We should also decide this today

- 1. They are a good, engaging speaker
- 2. They and their talk would be of interest to our target audience
  - The User and employee community and potentially the local public
- 3. They are realistically likely to be able to accept our invitation
  - Having a personal or scientific connection really helps
  - So does sending out the invitation as much in advance as possible, and via official channels (the Directorate)

We on the UEC represent the User community, and it is our responsibility to act with that as our first priority.
