Poster Peer Review

Jonathan Rositas's poster, "Coherent Pion Production to Constrain DUNE Flux," was informative and excellently presented. The poster was nicely organized in two distinct columns, so it was easy to follow the flow of the poster. However, the poster is also quite crowded, so at times, it can be overwhelming to look at. I would recommend removing some of the text in each of the sections and giving the figures and equations more room around them; the extra spacing would help draw more attention to the figures. Jonathan does a great job outlining the motivation and theory behind his work in the first three sections of the poster, and the plots all look exceptional. Jonathan's poster clearly indicates that he has a very strong understanding of the material he is presenting, and he nicely explains the major takeaways from his work. Though the summary section helps reinforce the poster's main ideas, it is largely unnecessary; space is limited on a poster, and all of the information is displayed on a single page anyway, so I would recommend removing the summary section and using that extra room to make the poster a little less cramped. Overall, Jonathan's poster is interesting and informative, and though it can be a lot to take in, it clearly conveys the excellent quality of his research.

Jonathan's research involves theory I am not familiar with, but based on the positive reception to his work, I could tell that his poster was accurate and well researched. Many people came by to check out his poster, and Jonathan eagerly and confidently presented his work to them. As a speaker, Jonathan spoke clearly, maintained eye contact, and moved at a steady pace. However, Jonathan tended to speak for very long intervals of time, so rather than spending over ten minutes presenting all the details of his work to each visitor, I would recommend providing a short overview and allowing the audience to ask questions if they want to know more. Ultimately, Jonathan excellently presented his poster, and though he could be a little long-

winded, his great poster and passionate presentation reflected his well-deserved pride in his
research.
